JVS Puts a Spark in the Local Workforce

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Students are leaving JVS with industry credentials and certifications that position them to not only launch their careers but gain meaningful employment right out of high school.

Joe Thayer, a 22-year member of the Local 33 Sheet Metal Workers Union and parent of a current JVS senior cosmetology student, said JVS is training students to be job-ready. “They are continually improving on getting students workplace-ready, and this includes teaching them the soft skills that are also needed. The training is fantastic, regardless of the sector, and I feel JVS is one of the most important pillars of Lorain County.”

Ken Kudela, Director of the Ohio-Kentucky Administrative District Council of Bricklayers and Allied Craftworkers and a JVS Alum, said he spends a lot of his time promoting the JVS high school and adult programs. “There is such a high demand for not only bricklayers, but also all crafts in the construction fields right now and it’s a smaller group that’s coming in. All of us baby boomers are moving on and retiring at huge numbers. By partnering with JVS, we’re trying to fill that void.”

After meeting a junior welding student during a tour, Matt Hlavin, CEO of Thogus Plastic Injection Molding in Avon proclaimed, “You are our future.” Hlavin added, “JVS has the

What’s New? *The Drones Have Landed at JVS*



THE JVS ENGINEERING DESIGN & Technology program has added a drone curriculum to its program this year. The class currently has a set of 10 coding drones and a large industrial drone for more advanced use. “We are currently planning to have flight, coding, and 3D printing projects of objects in engineering,” said EDT instructor Stormy Rush.

As part of the program, students prepare detailed technical drawings used to build everything from spacecraft to bridges to buildings. Rush said adding the drone element is a plus. Students are also learning both manual and computer drafting skills working with software packages including AutoCAD, SolidWorks, Inventor, and Revit Architecture. They are also learning problem-solving techniques and precision measurement.

Rush adds, “Drones are here to stay and are connected to many of the careers that my students are pursuing. The job market is beginning to boom—in energy, civil engineering, agriculture, and others.” The district is ensuring that our future engineers are ready to meet the demands of those ever-changing fields. Getting a head start on the world of drones is putting them in a position to soar!

JVS Expanding to Include More Ninth & Tenth Graders

THE LORAIN COUNTY JVS IS EXPANDING its ninth and tenth grade programs next school year by adding 100 additional students. Currently, there are about 100 students in each grade, but a waiting list of 150 students compelled the school district to look at expanding the programs.

“When students enroll at the beginning of high school, they are able to explore the various programs, utilizing a hands-on approach,

which has proven to be very successful in career tech education,” said Dr. Glenn Faircloth, Superintendent of JVS.

Principal Jill Petitti added that although some students enter JVS wanting to pursue the careers of their parents. “The ninth grade program really gives students a first look at their potential careers.”

In the tenth grade, students will have an opportunity in the Career Exploration program to narrow their interests down to four programs spending nine weeks exploring them in the labs with the instructors and upperclassmen.

“It is incumbent on us to show them everything we can. We like that wide variety,” said ninth-grade instructor Eric Robson. “We expose them to a lot. It is like a funnel. We start big and funnel it down. By their junior year, they will narrow it down and choose their career.”

Petitti said they have seen many success stories from the four-year students. “We have identified the Outstanding Seniors in our career-tech programs, and many of them have come through our ninth- and tenth-grade programs.”

Hands-On Learning a Perfect Fit for Non-Traditional Welder

WOMEN CAN DO ANYTHING, EVEN WHAT men typically do. This is the message that Rhonda Lassen Cain wants her sixteen-year-old daughter Kayla Lassen to learn.

Over the summer, Kayla thought she might want to try welding during her sophomore year at Lorain County JVS. “I told my Mom that I wanted to try out welding and she was like, go for it! The first day in the lab, it was like boom, I liked it,” Kayla excitedly shared.

lab each quarter. Upon completion of their sophomore year, students will then make an informed decision when applying for a two-year career-technical program.

Even though she found the welding lab to be difficult, Kayla liked the challenge. “Mr. Schreiber said that he saw potential in me, and that really made me want to keep working at it.”

Mark Schreiber, the high school welding and fabrication instructor added, “This kid has raw talent, and she is only a sophomore.”

According to the U.S. Department of Labor, women make up approximately two percent of the welders in the United States, but those in the field—including Mr. Schreiber—hope to see that number increase.

“The demand is very high for skilled trade workers right now, especially welding,” Schreiber explained, “and more women are moving in this direction and the industry has had to adapt to the women coming in.”

According to Lassen Cain, her daughter is a hands-on learner, which is why she knew JVS would be a perfect fit for her.

Kayla had the opportunity to show her mom exactly what she has been learning by taking her into the welding booth at JVS.

“That was so awesome,” Lassen Cain said through tears as she exited the booth. “I’m so proud of her. She had great confidence and was so patient with me. It was an incredible moment.”

After successful completion of the JVS welding and fabrication two-year program, Kayla and other JVS students have the opportunity to take the American Welding Society certification test to earn the twelve-point industry credential and become a certified welder.

As for her future, Kayla is still figuring it all out. “I think I want to work in a shop for a couple of years, just to see how that is and see where that can lead me.”

JVS Partners with LCCC to Give Students an Advantage towards Associate Degrees

THE LORAIN COUNTY JVS AND LORAIN County Community College have launched an initiative that gives students an opportunity to earn a year's worth of college credits (or about 30 credits) from Lorain County Community College that goes towards an associate degree while still in high school.

Dr. Glenn Faircloth, Superintendent of JVS, and Dr. Marcia J. Ballinger, the president of LCCC, announced the Career & College Advantage (CCA) program this fall, which can save families \$5,000 or more in college costs.

"Lorain County Community College is thrilled to provide Lorain County JVS students with a

The partnership launched with four JVS programs including Culinary Arts, Network Communication Technology, Project Lead the Way—Engineering and Computerized Design and Drafting. In eight additional program pathways, students can earn a full semester worth of credits or more in Allied Health Sciences; Bakery and Pastry Arts; Sports, Health and Fitness Technology; Teacher Education Exploration;

pathway to a year's worth of college credits—at no cost to their families. The Career & College Advantage program is a great option for students and provides a direct connection to internships and employment with local companies," said LCCC President Marcia J. Ballinger, Ph.D.

The CCA program embeds college credits through Lorain County Community College's Credit Plus program, along with articulation agreements with LCCC and the state of Ohio.

"The partnership with LCCC is yet another opportunity for students who are interested in getting a head start as they transition into post education after high school," said Dr. Glenn

Carpentry; Precision Machine Technology; Heating and Air Conditioning; and Welding and Fabrication. Classes are held on both the JVS and LCCC campuses.

LCCC and JVS are working to expand CCA to have every JVS career pathway connected to College Credit Plus with the opportunity for students to earn at least 30 college credits in every program. "We are excited to expand upon our strong partnership and offer this innovative approach to higher education for our community—programs like CCA have the potential to be game-changers for our entire county," said Ballinger.

HELPING OTHERS FIND SUCCESS



Diana Gott wants people to be successful, and she has spent her career helping people do just that. In her current position as a Program Coordinator at Lorain County JVS Adult Career Center, she works directly with adults who are looking to get their high school diploma and learn a trade at the same time.

The Ohio Adult Diploma Program allows adult learners this opportunity. "This program allows people to get their diploma by taking the WorkKeys test, enrolling in and passing a training program and also passing the certification at the end of the program," explains Gott. "Once they have met this criteria, they are awarded their high school diploma and are also able to start their career because of the training they received."

Gott began her career with JVS twenty-seven years ago teaching an office basics class to adults who wanted to return to work and needed new skills. With a bachelor's degree in business education and a master's degree in curriculum, she has worked in numerous capacities throughout her career from being a certified job profiler, who writes job descriptions for companies, to providing pre-employment testing where training is needed.



Finding the key to helping someone find success is about the approach you take, according to Gott. "Here at the JVS Adult Career Center, we offer a more personal approach to our training. We have learned that the way the training is delivered, has a lot to do with one's success!"

“IT’S NOT IMPOSSIBLE. IF YOU HAVE THE mindset and willingness to change, then don’t let anything stand in your way,” Kristen Stout said. “I have five kids and I did it.”

The mother of the boys, ranging from 3 to 15 years of age, received her Emergency Medical Technician certification through the Lorain County JVS Adult Career Center and is now working for the Village of Grafton Fire Department.

“It was challenging trying to balance school, being a mom, plus I was working,” Kristen said. “My husband was gone 13 to 14 hours a day at his job, so I stayed up late studying, and studied during naptimes and while I was cooking.”

Kristen already worked in healthcare as a home health aide for hospice but was looking to do something more.

“It was about ten years ago when I was interested in becoming a medic,” Kristen said.

That interest became reality when she took that first step and enrolled in the nine month Emergency Medical Technician program.

“It was scary [going back to school]. I felt like it was freshman year in high school all over again, and I hated school to begin with, so the anxiety was ten times worse,” Kristen said. “But I enjoyed it. You become great friends not only with people in your class but also with your instructors. It’s like a family.”

There were some challenging times but Kristen said her instructors, Scott Kaminski and Derick Oswald, helped her through it.

“There were days where I was like ‘I’m not going to pass this test, I’m not going to do this, I can’t, the kids are sick, I need to be at home.’ Scott’s like ‘No, no—you’ve got to do this.’”

Kristen also recalled a time when she went on the road for a call.

“During my ride time I had a traumatic call and Scott and Derek were there to talk me down from that.”

Scott, who is also the program coordinator, said Kristen succeeded because she wanted it. “I don’t know what her fire was, but to do that with five kids at home and a husband who worked full-time shows dedication,” he said.

Kristen adds, “One of my favorite quotes from another instructor is ‘The only thing standing in between you and your dream is whatever reason you tell yourself.’”

Kristen’s fire has spread to her oldest son. “Xavier, will be going to Public Safety [academy at Lorain County JVS] his junior/senior year. He has always wanted to do the medical program with me and become an army doctor. I told him nothing was impossible.”

Her husband was also inspired by his wife and plans to attend the police academy to fulfill his career aspirations. He will also face similar challenges as Kristen.

“With the current certification needed for my day job—my EMT license—I actually make more than Dan,” Kristen said. “So we switched roles and he’s the stay-at-home parent.”



Kristen said that, being a mom, there are calls that hit home—like the pediatric calls.

“When they are the same age as one of my kids, I really take it to heart,” she said. “But at the same time I am actually less sympathetic with my kids. I know that sounds bad but I know the severity of injuries. I can assess their wounds and know what truly needs medical attention.”

Kristen said her responsibilities as an EMT include everything from trauma triage (stopping bleeding and immobilizing broken bones), assessing and transporting stroke and cardiac arrest calls, to wellness checks.

PUBLIC SAFETY INSTRUCTORS ARE PREPARING STUDENTS TO SAVE LIVES

Together, JVS instructors Scott Kaminski and Jeff Dawson (pictured below, l to r) have over 56 years of experience in public safety and are on a mission to produce educated,



dedicated and professional firefighters and emergency medical technicians to serve our communities.

“Our combined knowledge, education and numerous years of service are just some of the qualities that we bring to the students of JVS,” said Dawson who is the high school Public Safety instructor. At the end of the two-year program, his students take Firefighter II and Basic EMT tests.

Kaminski, the Adult Public Safety Coordinator said his students participate in a 150-hour EMT course required for certification as an EMT in the State of Ohio.

The two instructors collaborate on testing, using each other as proctors for skills testing, on both the fire and EMS areas.

Kaminski said their goal is simple. “When a department hires a JVS public safety grad they have the peace of mind knowing the employee is well trained, has a better skill set and the confidence to do the job.”

AFTER SPENDING SEVEN YEARS IN THE retail industry, 28-year-old Collin Horseman knew he had to make a major change. "I had to get out of there," Horseman added. "I reached a point where I wanted to make my life better."

Horseman put a plan into action. "I like to create things, so I did my research and found out that there was a high demand for machin-

Horseman enrolled in the PMT course in September 2017 and completed the 600-hour course in June 2018. "It is not a hard program, but you have to put the time in and can't slack off. You have to pay attention to what's going on." Horseman landed an adult internship at Nordson Corporation as a CNC machinist prior to graduation. "I was ecstatic... elated. There

ists and other precision machine technology positions," said Horseman. "I also realized that they paid well."

The adult Precision Machine Technology program, prepares students for a future in tool and die, computer numerical control (CNC), mold making, and many other metalworking trades. Upon completing the course, students take a test to receive the National Institute of Metalworking Skills (NIMS) certification.

Horseman has advice for others who may be stuck in a job as he was. "Don't be afraid to make that change or be worried you might make the wrong decision. Select something you enjoy, and make that jump."

That leap of faith changed Horseman's entire life. "Coming to JVS is one of the best decisions I ever made. The program did not just give me a job. It gave me a real career, and I am making good money too."

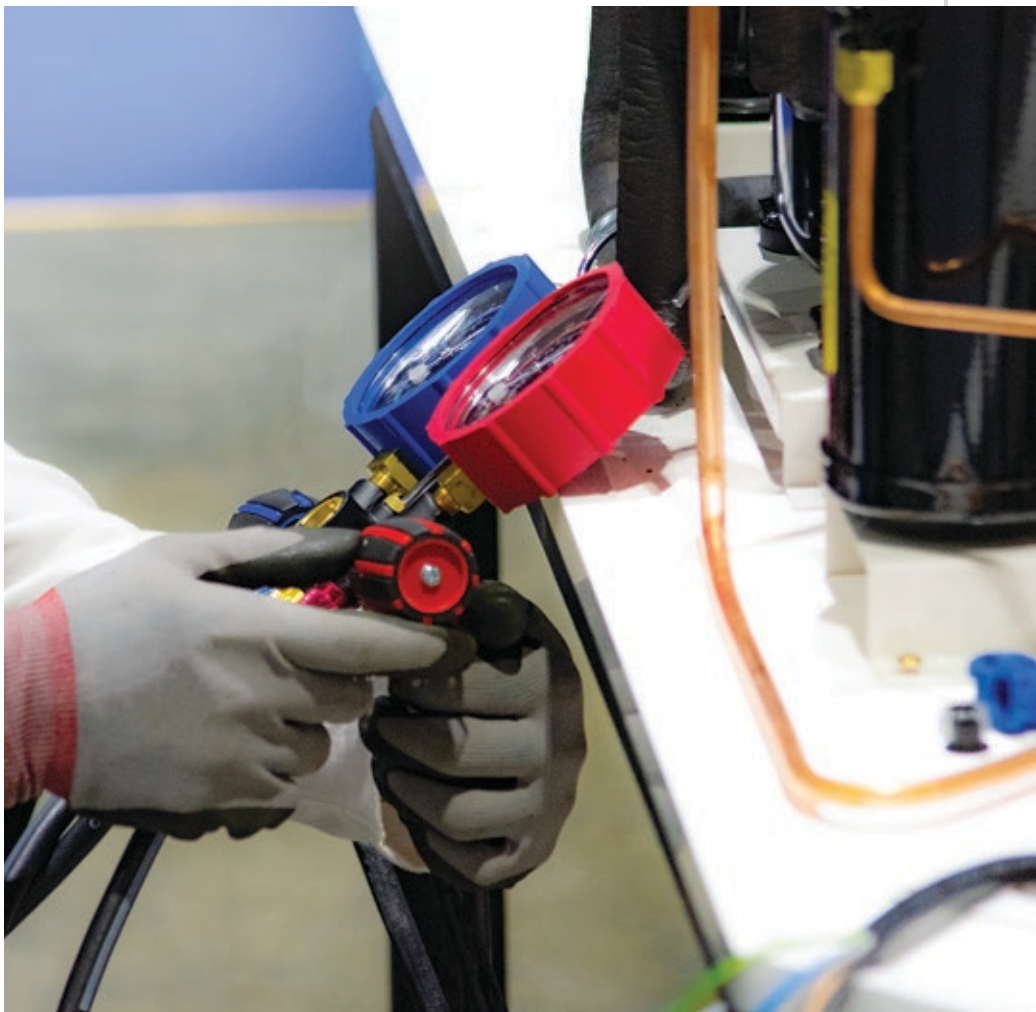

GENERAL INFORMATION

Financial Aid

Financial Aid may be available to assist with the cost of tuition and other educational expenses. Each funding source has different eligibility requirements. Call (440) 774-1051, ext. 22322, today for an appointment.

Pell Grants

What is a Pell Grant? It is a federal need-based grant that assists with educational expenses to those who qualify. It does **not** have to be repaid. Programs of 600 hours or more are Pell Grant eligible.

How do I apply for the Pell Grant? Complete a free application at www.fafsa.ed.gov or we will be glad to assist you in completing it. You will need your Federal Income Tax Return or income information.

William D. Ford Federal Direct Stafford Loans

Direct Loans are low-interest loans for students to help pay for the cost of a student’s education after high school. The lender is the U.S. Department of Education. With Direct Loans, you borrow directly from the federal government and have a single contact—your loan servicer—for everything related to repayment. Direct loans must be repaid. Direct Loans are available to those who qualify in programs of 600 hours or more.

Ohio Means Jobs—Lorain County Funding

As a partner of Ohio Means Jobs, Lorain County, those programs and applicants who are eligible may receive funding to attend our classes. Interested candidates will need to contact the Ohio Means Jobs Office early to complete the processes to be eligible for funding—call (440) 324-5244.

Robert D. Beecheler Memorial Scholarship

To be eligible for this scholarship, you must be a Lorain County JVS high school completer who is enrolling into a career development program. In addition, you must demonstrate a financial need. Applications can be picked up in the Adult Career Center office.

25% Tuition Discount

Any high school student who completed a Lorain County JVS high school program in 2018 and enrolls into an adult career development program in the spring will automatically receive a 25% tuition discount. For additional information, contact the Adult Career Center office.

Payment Plans

Students may conveniently make payment plan arrangements by speaking to an Adult Career Center secretary. A valid Visa, MasterCard or Discover credit card must be presented. Note: The cardholder must be present to sign the payment plan. Other related expenses may not be covered on the payment plan. The first payment of any payment plan is due on the first class meeting. Subsequent payments are assigned. By signing the payment plan agreement, students are obligated to make payments as scheduled. If a payment is missed, it will be applied to the credit card on file. Students may be administratively withdrawn for past due payments. A certificate of completion will not be given to any student who has a payment plan balance. Career Development Programs

Some career development programs are Pell Grant or ITA (Individual Training Accounts through Ohio Means Jobs) eligible and require a high school diploma or GED. Some safety-sensitive education programs may require drug testing and/or background checks prior to admission. Career Development Programs include placement assistance and employability skills training.

Employment Opportunities

The Career Services Office serves as a liaison between students and the employment community. An ongoing database of available employment opportunities is maintained and

made available to job seekers. Job seekers are directed to potential employment opportunities based on their skills, training and experience.

Withdrawal and Refund Policy

If a student finds it necessary to withdraw from a course, the student must contact the Adult Career Center. Students who wish to withdraw who receive Title IV funding (Pell Grants and/or Federal Direct Stafford Loans) must meet with the Student Services department of the Adult Career Center. Refunds are given to students who withdraw prior to the first day of class with the exception of the following fees that will be withheld:

100 HOURS AND ABOVE:

\$100 administrative fee will be held.

99–21 HOURS:

\$25 administrative fee will be held.

20 HOURS AND BELOW:

\$10 administrative fee will be held if the class has started at time of withdrawal.

ADMINISTRATIVE WITHDRAWAL POLICY

A student may be administratively withdrawn from his/her program for missing eight or more consecutive days, being absent for over ten percent of the total clock hours of the program, or for violation of school or classroom rules or policies. Tuition and fees owed at the time of withdrawal must be paid according to the withdrawal/refund policy.

REFUNDS

Refund amounts are calculated based on the official withdrawal date which is either the date the student contacts the office to notify the Adult Career Center of the intent to withdraw, or the date at which a student is administratively withdrawn due to lack of attendance. The last day a student attends class is the official date for withdraw. Refund amounts are based on the amount the student has paid toward the class tuition and fees. Books and supply costs are nonrefundable. A refund amount may never exceed the amount the student has actually paid toward the tuition of the class.

100 HOURS AND ABOVE:

A 90% refund is given during the first week of class, after the \$100 administrative fee is retained. Refunds are calculated based on full tuition fees. After the first week of class, refunds are prorated and based on the hours the program was held until the official date of withdrawal.

99–21 HOUR CLASSES:

A 90% refund is given during the first week of class, after the \$25 administrative fee is retained. Refunds are calculated based on full tuition fees. After the first week of class, refunds are prorated and based on the hours the program was held until the official date of withdrawal.

UNDER 20 HOURS:

A 50% refund is given after the first night of class, after the \$10 administrative fee is retained. Once a student has attended two class sessions, no refund is issued. Please allow four weeks for refunds to be processed. Classes require a minimum number of students registered to commence. Classes with insufficient enrollment will be canceled.

Eligibility for Licensure, Certification or Employment
